





Land Planning


- Future buildings (agricultural & other)



Easement Drafting




- Purpose clauses

Funding

- Federal
 - Farm and Ranch Land Protection Program
 - Forest Legacy Program
 - Grassland Reserve Program
- State
 - Examples of several states
- Local
 - PACE programs
 - Private funding





Federal Funding

- Forest Legacy
- Grassland Reserve Program (GRP)
- Farm and Ranch Lands Protection Program (FRPP)
 - 50% cost share
 - \$100 million/year
 - Topsoil protection





State Funding

- 27 state programs
- Northeast states predominate
- Funding sources include:
 - General revenues
 - Bonds
 - Transfer taxes and fees
 - Sin taxes





Local Municipal Funding



- Leverage federal and state \$
- Funding sources include:
 - General revenues
 - Bonds
 - Transfer taxes and fees
 - Sales taxes






Private Funding Sources

- Can leverage public \$
- Need to "fit" the public program
- Can leverage landowner donations with "bargain sales"


