STATUS OF STATE PACE PROGRAMS

OVERVIEW

As of January 2023, 28 states had active state-level purchase of agricultural conservation easement (PACE) programs. The interior table displays the status and summarizes important information about farm and ranch land protection programs in 30 states. Montana and Alabama no longer have active programs but are included in the table because they have funded easement purchases in the past. Two additional states—Georgia and Missouri—have authorized PACE but have not yet allocated funds or acquired easements. For a program to be added to the table, it must have state authorization, must protect agricultural land, fund easement acquisitions, and have received funding.

EXPLANATION OF COLUMN HEADINGS


Year of Inception/Year of First Acquisition

Year in which the PACE program was authorized and year in which the program acquired its first easement.


Method of Protection

Methods used to permanently protect land. Options include directly acquiring easements, providing funds to public entities, like local governments or soil conservation districts, or providing funds to private entities, like land trusts. Some programs use multiple approaches.

Interests Held

Legal interests held or retained by the program once the land protection transaction has been completed. Options include agricultural conservation easement (ACE) as sole grantee, ACE as co-holder where the program and a partner both hold the easement and have equal interests, only third party right of enforcement, executory interest, and intervener and mediator. Some programs reported more than one type of interest held.

Easements Acquired

Number of agricultural conservation easements acquired through the program. This number does not necessarily reflect the total number of farms/ranches protected because some programs acquire a property in stages and/or may hold multiple easements on the same farm/ranch. As noted above, some programs do not hold easements but instead provide funds for easement purchases to local governments or land trusts and retain a lesser legal interest in the easement.

Acres Protected

Number of agricultural acres protected by the program.

Program Funds Spent to Date

Dollars spent to date by each program to acquire easements on farms/ranches. This amount may include unspent funds dedicated for installment payments on completed projects. Unless otherwise noted, these figures do not reflect incidental land acquisition costs, such as appraisals, insurance and recording fees, nor the administrative costs of running the program. Also not included are additional funds contributed by federal programs, local governments, private land trusts, foundations, nor individuals (see "Additional Funds Spent").

Funds contributed to date by federal programs, local governments, private land trusts, foundations, corporations, and/or individuals (see "Funding Sources Used").

Program Funds Available

Program funds available for the current fiscal year to acquire easements on agricultural land.

Funding Sources Used

Sources of funding to date for each program. Funding sources in blue indicate the primary funding source.

"Federal transportation funding" refers to money disbursed by the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration to support transportation alternatives and enhancements.

The Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration Program (REPI) provides funds to establish easementprotected buffer areas around military installations.

The federal Coastal Impact Assistance Program authorizes funds to be distributed to oil and gas producing states to mitigate the impacts of oil and gas extraction from the continental shelf.

The Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) protects agricultural land and conserves wetlands. The Agricultural Land Easements (ALE) component of ACEP provides matching funds to eligible entities to buy conservation easements on farm and ranch land. In the table, ACEP-ALE funding is inclusive of FRPP.

The Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) is another source of federal funding for some programs.

In addition to these sources of funding, several programs reported contributions from private sources.



All other figures represent cumulative activity of the state-authorized county programs. "Program Funds Spent" includes dollars invested by the county boards.
