

FARM VIABILITY ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM – The role of agricultural covenants in supporting farm viability

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PROGRAM GOAL: to provide business assistance to increase the financial viability of farm businesses and to preserve and support stewardship of agricultural resources.

BACKGROUND:

- Farm Viability Enhancement Program initiated in 1996 in response to recognition that Massachusetts was losing farms to development.
- Legislation: M.G.L. c. 20, § 22 "the department may acquire non-development covenants for terms of limited duration...shall be exempt from any regulations that require an appraisal, an environmental site assessment and a survey. The department may require other expedited requirements appropriate for the duration of the non-development covenant."
- First program in the country to provide combined approach: business and technical assistance, grants, and term covenants.

FVEP Results to Date:

- 473 farms have benefited from assistance and grant funding;
- 46,187 acres placed in protective covenants;
- Total grants to farms \$22,676,472 (\$47,942 average per farm)



ANNUAL TIMELINE

- > Open application period for farms to apply(8 weeks in early spring)
- Application review (late spring/summer)
- Notification of selection for Phase I (Aug)
- Orientation visits at farms (Sept)
- > Phase I: Business planning & technical assistance (Oct-March)
- > Phase II: Grants in return for Agricultural Covenants on farm property (April)
- Closeout visits upon project completion; evaluations



PHASE I – Business Planning & Technical Assistance

- Each farm assigned a business planner to work with one-on one to develop a farm business plan including financial projections
- Additional technical assistance available based on individual farm needs. Examples include:
 - Quickbooks assistance
 - Marketing plans
 - Websites
 - Building layout/evaluation
 - Pasture management
 - Succession Planning

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DAR PHASE II – Grant for Covenant

Agricultural Covenant in return for the grant to ensure farm is kept in active agriculture for fixed 10 or 15-year term.

The intention of the Agricultural Covenants is to protect and preserve agricultural lands; encourage sound soil management practices; preserve natural resources; and maintain land in active agricultural use through improving the agricultural economic viability of the /Premises according to the terms of a Department approved FVEP Plan completed through the program.

- Covenant contains retained rights, prohibited uses, and activities that require prior approval from the Department; and affirmative duty to farm.
- Whole farm approach: entire farm property is protected. A minor exclusion may be considered by the Department if a separate parcel or legal description is provided. (No surveys or appraisals).
- Covenants signed by landowners & recorded with title at county Registry of Deeds; in case of P&S terms transfer to new owner
- Covenants enforceable through Article 97 of Massachusetts Constitution which protects land for conservation purposes and ensure they are not converted to other uses; a release requires Dept approval & 2/3 vote of legislature.



Phase II – Grant for Covenant

- Grant Contract amounts vary: currently \$100,000 \$200,000 (based on size of farm: GFI & total acreage) associated with a 10 or 15-year term
- Grant must be spent on agreed upon capital projects identified in the plan
- Eligible uses of funds flexible based on needs of each operation include farm infrastructure, equipment, or resource improvements.

Recent projects:

- Wash-pack building
- Heifer barn & milk tank upgrades
- Hay production equipment
- Well installation
- Maple equipment & concrete floor in sugarhouse
- Tractor
- Hay storage barn & equipment repair shop







PROGRAM IMPACTS

Preliminary questionaire results:

43% of respondents who participated within last 10 years are more likely or somewhat more likely to be interested in permanently protecting their farm.



RELATED MDAR PROGRAMS

- APR Program state Agricultural Preservation Restrictions (APRs) protected in perpetuity
 - Initiative of Farm Viability & APR staff working together reach out to expiring covenant holders to explore land use options
- Other MDAR Farm Viability programs modeled after FVEP:
 - APR Improvement Program (AIP)– farm viability assistance & infrastructure grants for permanently protected APR farms
 - Matching Enterprise Grants for Agriculture farm viability assistance & matching grants for beginning farms 1-10 years in business
- Agricultural Business Assistance
 - Growing Your Farm Business plan course group approach to develop a farm business plan
 - Farm-Pass In 2025, MDAR is piloting one on one assistance for farms with identified successors to develop a written farm transfer plan
